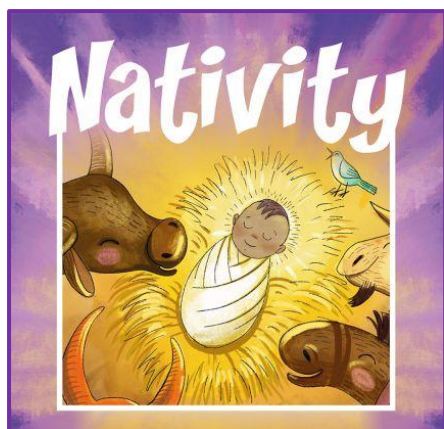

A white poppy is a symbol of peace and remembrance for all victims of war, including civilians and military personnel, and represents a commitment to non-violent solutions to conflict. It serves as a challenge to any celebration or glorification of war and a reminder of the "Never again" spirit after conflict.

A good afternoon was had by all.

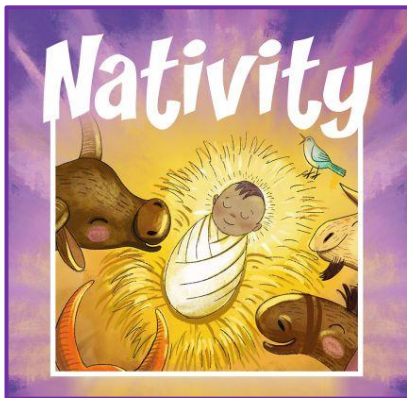

### **PILGRIMAGE FOR SOFTIES – a note from Karen**

In the summer, I went away with my Mum for a week and in the afternoons, we settled down and watched every episode of the BBC series, 'Pilgrimage'.

It really got me thinking that I would love, absolutely love, to go on a pilgrimage. Strictly speaking, a pilgrimage is a journey to a special place, usually a holy one. Pilgrimages are nothing new but in recent years, pilgrim routes, like the Camino de Santiago, have gained popularity.

One of my nonreligious river swimming friends makes the pilgrimage nearly every year. So, I have looked into it and realised that this is not an option for me. Too far, too tough on my knees, too expensive and too many people! Back to the drawing board.

My Spiritual director then made a radical suggestion. After I see her, for my usual six-weekly session, I then take the rest of the day as a pilgrimage day. I walk somewhere or go somewhere, disconnect from my phone, and spend the day with God, praying as and when stuff comes into my head.

I decided to do the Capital Ring walk. The most beautiful sections seem to have been completed at the start. I have walked, so far, Sections 1-4. Although there were some nice woods and commons, there has also been a lot of pavements, and housing estates. It is definitely not a beautiful, holy, pilgrimage walk.

However, in Hosea 2 v15, there are these words: “There I will give her back her vineyards and will make the Valley of Achor a door of hope.”. Valley of Achor means valley of trouble. It echoes Psalm 84 v6 which talks about the valley of Baca becoming a valley of springs.

Putting one foot in front of the other, disconnecting from phones and simply walking and praying is a beautifully simple way to pray God’s hope into an area or for a person as they come to mind. You can even turn your walk to church or to the shops or from one room to another in your house into a pilgrimage. You can sit on a bus, the train or the car and do the same thing. There is something powerful about journeying and praying (just don’t shut your eyes if you are driving!)

Meanwhile, if you want to try a different take on Pilgrimage, Doreen recommends reading: Jesus : A Pilgrimage by James Martin.
